Two year old Sally Haggard received an additional blessing this trip. Tuesday after dinner, she was baptized in the creek behind the play yard. Mom Sara had the idea after meeting the minister who officiated last year at Chris Woodard's & Daryl Louder's wedding. Through a series of e-mails, she set things up with Mike Funkhouser to come over from Wardensville and douse young Sally's head. "She did great," remarked Sara.

DINING DRESS DO-OVER

For the first time in Capon's history, the waitress staff was not decked out all in white this week. And all because of a wedding earlier this year. When serving the Zimmerman wedding at Sunset Lodge in May, waitresses Christy Copeland and Samantha Pappas asked dining room supervisors Lydia Hott and Dorothy Walker about wearing Capon collared shirts for the event. Both Lydia and Dorothy liked the idea—one that had been floating around for years, but had not been attempted, because it was assumed it would make them too hot. However, with the new light weight material now used in clothing, they decided to give it a try. At first they used the bright pink shirts already available in the food shop. When Food Service manager Carolyn Budnyk made the decision to make the experiment permanent, the pink color was no longer available. Food shop "queen" Ginny Brill suggested a light green tone. So at dinner Tuesday night, guests were treated to a sea of pastel mint Capon polo shirts.



The complete white outfits have been the staple since the 1930s, sparking some guests to affectionately refer to the wait staff as "nurses". The new uniform look provides both a common style of dress and keeps Capon's informal atmosphere intact. Even though it was a significant departure from past Capon tradition, Lydia reported receiving guest praise about the new look.

There was a three way tie for second as many golfers claimed their prizes. Jim Tatano, Jerry Alms, Wendy Bratz, Joe Napier, and Missy Lauber; Ty Joncas, Chuck Morris, Lynn Hersey, Mike Napier, and Ilene McCaffrey; and Jim Crinkley, Ken Kennedy, Alan Boxley, Jim Grim, and Colleen Tatano all completed the nine hole course one stroke behind the leaders. Three of teams were within striking distance only 2 shots back.

During Friday morning's tourney, the fivesomes only got about half way through the course when Golf Tourney Director Pete Budnyk called it off due to pouring rain. Play resumed where it left off on Saturday morning at 9:30am.
